




Tuesday Takes Me There by Luis Carlos Montalván





Grandpa 1 to 10 and Back Again by Tony Hunter

Nubs The True Story of a Mutt, a Marine & a Miracle


Nubs: The True Story of a Mutt, a Marine, & a Miracle by Major Brian




H is for Honor by Devin Scillian


Wind Flyers by Angela Johnson







The Mailbox by Audrey Shafer

Two years later he comes home to discover that his uncle has died of a heart attack, he's terrified of going back into the system—so he tells no one. The next day, he discovers a strange note in his mailbox: I HAVE A SECRET. DO NOT BE AFRAID. And his uncle's body is gone. Thus begins a unique correspondence destined to save the two people that depended on Vernon for everything.

Kelly McAllister feels at odds with everyone around her. Kelly becomes so involved in the plight of a homeless Vietnam vet. Interviewing him began as a Social Studies project, but it takes on new meaning after her offers of food and friendship backfire into a real disaster. What had the war done to destroy this man? And what had it done to her own father who refuses to speak of it?






Prisoner B-3087 by Alan Gratz

As a Jewish boy in 1930s Poland, Yanek is at the mercy of the Nazis who have taken over. Everything he has, and everyone he loves, have been snatched from him. And then Yanek himself is taken prisoner -- his arm tattooed with the words PRISONER B-3087. As se is forced from one concentration camp to another he encounters evil he could have never imagined, but also sees surprising glimpses of hope. He just barely escapes death, only to confront it again seconds later. Can Yanek make it through the terror without losing his hope, his will -- and, most of all, his sense of who he really is inside?

Dogs of War by Sheila Keenan & Nathan Fox

DOGS OF WAR is a graphic novel that tells the stories of the canine military heroes of World War I, World War II, and the Vietnam War. This collection of three fictional stories was inspired by historic battles and real military practice. Each story tells the remarkable adventures of a soldier and his service dog and is rendered with fascinating and beautiful detail, bringing to life the faithful dogs who braved bombs, barrages, and battles to save the lives of countless soldiers.

A historical novel presents the thoughts of a young soldier during war while capturing the feelings of being in battle through the sights, sounds, and struggles he experiences at the battle of Normandy during World War II.




Somebody Please Tell Me Who I Am by Harry Mazer

Birdy and the others in the Civilian Affairs Battalion are supposed to help secure and stabilize the country and successfully interact with the Iraqi people. 


The Impossible Knife of Memory by Laurie Halse Anderson

For the past five years, Hayley Kincaid and her father, Andy, have been on the road, never staying long in one place as he struggles to escape the demons that have tortured him since his return from Iraq. Now they are in the town where he grew up so Hayley can attend school. Perhaps, for the first time, Hayley can have a normal life, put aside her own painful memories, even have a relationship. Will being back home help Andy's PTSD, or will his terrible memories drag him to the edge of hell, and drugs push him over?

Purple Heart by Patricia McCormick

When Private Matt Duffy wakes up in an army hospital in Iraq, he's honored with a Purple Heart. But he doesn't feel like a hero. There's a memory that haunts him: an image of a young Iraqi boy as a bullet hits his chest. Matt can't shake the feeling that he was involved in his death. But because of a head injury, Matt can't quite put all the pieces together. Matt just wants to go back to being the soldier he once was. But he sees potential threats everywhere and lives in fear of not being able to pull the trigger when the time comes. In combat there is no black-and-white, and Matt soon discovers that the notion of who is guilty is very complicated indeed.





Great Falls by Steve Watkins

Shane has always worshiped his big brother, Jeremy. But three tours in Iraq and Afghanistan have taken their toll, and the easy-go-lucky brother Shane knew has been replaced with a man who lives in the basement. When Jeremy shows up after Shane's football game and offers to take him to the family cabin, Shane goes along. But as the camping trip turns into a days-long canoe trip, Shane realizes he's in way over his head — and has no idea how to persuade Jeremy to return home and get the help he needs before it's too late.
